From our name on the marquee at the airport, welcoming our arrival, to the hospitality shown by hotel, restaurant, and bar staff, to the special tours set up of Frank Lloyd Wright's Darwin Martin house and Louis Sullivan's Guaranty Building, it seemed the entire city was bending over backwards to show us a good time. Love At the Library

Monday, February 28 marked the grand unveiling of the Pierre Koenig Memorial Library. Even as the library celebrates its three-month anniversary, its novelty and beauty hasn't dimmed: the glowing lantern of a room beckons all who walk by the Alpha Rho Chi house neatly recessed from the rest of Fraternity Row. Its yellow walls jump out of the double-paned windows of the Victorian house, over the lawn, and across the white rose garden until the light hits one in the face, all while the room hides herself behind the mystery of sheer white curtains, keeping you guessing of what treasures lie within her luminous vestal. And as most passers-by continue their stroll with a new sense of curiosity, familiar faces approach the house without hesitation. For them, the secret is out and the mystery may be lost, but the love affair that began on February 28th is still alive and kicking. On this one magical night as the curtains were drawn back, students and

both, compared this convention to the 54th convention in Lincoln. Without the massive attractions of cities like Chicago, D.C., or Las Vegas, brothers hung together with brothers, temporarily casting aside chapter affiliation, age, and personal background to simply do what brothers do together — party (the convention did start on St. Patrick's Day)!

To begin talking about the national fraternity, I'll start with some numbers. At the afore-mentioned 55th Convention in Las Vegas, a ten-year plan was established, with goals for increasing membership and participation among both actives and alumni. By this point, three years into the plan, our goals were to have sixteen Active Chapters, 290 actives, and 214 participatory, dues-paying alumni brothers. As of the press date of this periodical, Alpha Rho Chi boasts eighteen active chapters, over 300 actives, and an estimated 220 alumni paying dues by the end of the fiscal year. In the last year, we have welcomed Metagenes (at Virginia Tech) and Dinocrates (at the University of Texas) back into the arch, and seen the establishment of two brand-new chapters: Domitian at the New Jersey Institute of Technology, in Newark; and Senenmut at the University of Buffalo, New York. In addition to these, three colonies are in the process of working towards becoming new active chapters: Amenophis (California College of the Arts, San Francisco), Hadrian (Tulane University in New Orleans), and Karpion (Miami University in Oxford, Ohio). And further interest is being cultivated at Ball State in Muncie, IN, the University of Hartford, in Connecticut, UC Berkeley, and two former chapters, Demetrios and Xenocles. Alpha Rho Chi is definitely growing by leaps and bounds.

The business meetings were packed with spirited, often heated, debate over the various

issues brought forth, handily mediated by the convention president, **Carlos Machado** of Cleisthenes, and the parliamentarian, our very own **Michael Ellars**. Further information on the specifics and details of the motions can be found in the Convention Minutes, once they are published, so it seems redundant to list them here.

I did what I could to meet and talk to as many brothers from as many chapters as possible. I learned much about my brothers, and about what brotherhood means across the country. Each chapter has its own methods, its own traditions, and its own concept of what makes a brother. Even within our own corner of the continent, the differences between Andronicus and Satyros are stark, if few in number.

Outside of the business meetings, of course, is where the most excitement usually happens at conventions, and Buffalo was no exception. Even just within the structured, scheduled programs, eye-opening and hilarious events ensued. T.J. Sullivan of CampuSpeak gave a presentation about "how to confront the idiot in your chapter," invoking much laughter and instilling some great ideas on intra-chapter relations. The Grand Lecturer, **Brian Swilling**, moderated a great, if somewhat intense, impromptu break-out session about the future (and the past) of

The event itself was just as guilty as the library was for the many amorous hearts that evening. As the clock struck seven, final preparations were made for the arrival of the first guests. The stage was set for one to fall in love: sweet intoxication, delicious hors d'oeuvres, and the melodious music of a jazz trio. Conversation thrived as the architectural community of USC rediscovered itself, and this opportunity alone — for familiar and new faces to gather — would have made the event memorable. However, in the back of everyone's mind, a pleasant anticipation lingered.

Worthy Architect **Alberto Lopez** eased this anticipation with his warm welcome to the guests, including Gloria and Randy Koenig, USC School of Architecture's Dean Robert Timme, and other faculty members. He spoke on behalf of the whole chapter of the special place the library project had taken in all of our hearts, ever since the idea was first conceived as a pledge project in the fall of 2004. Lopez's speech was followed by that of **Michael Ellars**, the president of the Andronicus Alumni Association. Ellars, who had the privilege of twice having Pierre Koenig as a professor, stressed the importance of education in the distinguished architect's life. It was apparent to Ellars, and to those who knew Koenig, that Pierre enjoyed being an educator as much as he did an architect. Dean Timme congratulated the fraternity on the decision to turn their study room

into a library as a sign of the fraternity's continued dedication towards education and the importance of books, especially in the realm of architecture.

After the speeches, as was only appropriate, Gloria Koenig cut the red ribbon stretching across the entrance to the library. The thick curtains were pulled down, the lights switched on, and a moment of hushed observation fell over the crowd. The library, humble in size, made a grand spectacle in sheer elegance. The white trim reminiscent of the room's Victorian roots complimented the new carnation yellow walls. The modern touch oozed of Koenig's personal style and that of his contemporaries. In the center of the room, on top the authentic wood flooring stood a black Noguchi coffee table on a tile-patterned rug. Cable display systems delicately hung lithographs of Koenig's architecture. The crowning pieces of the room included two original Eames folding sofas — originally donated by Pierre himself — one blue and one black, and a Eames wire chair with an Eiffel base in the corner, complete with black leather cushion. To top it all off, the famous portrait of Koenig in front of Case Study 21 hung above the fireplace, as if the man himself was observing with approval the library named in his honor. Even the books were impressive, thanks to donations from **Douglas Noble**, the fraternity's faculty advisor, and faculty member Andrew Liang.

The room drew the crowd in at the slow pace of appreciation and satisfaction. The event was a success; the library was a success. Visitors left the house impressed and active and alumni members felt a sense of achievement. Something memorable was done in honor of someone memorable, and that is always a lovely idea. •

From the President

Dear Brothers,

A colleague of mine recently asked me why I was so involved in my Fraternity even though I was no longer in college. The question so caught me off guard that I couldn't give her an immediate answer; in fact, I deliberated on the topic for most of the day.

This may seem like an odd reaction to such an obvious question, especially considering my role as President of the Andronicus Alumni Association. Yet I believe it is a question we should all ask ourselves from time to time.

Why are we staying involved in Alpha Rho Chi?

While I cannot speak for everyone on the Executive Board, I feel it is more than a basic desire to keep abreast of the activities of the Fraternity at the local and national levels. It is something at once both more fundamental and more complex than simple curiosity.

My answer to my colleague — and, I believe, what motivates all of us to some degree or another — is that I stay involved for the opportunity to impart my knowledge to the next generation of students who will become the professionals and leaders of industry after me. As an alumnus of both the Chapter and the University as a whole, I have a chance to impart my advice and counsel to the undergraduate members of our Fraternity. And as a member of the Andronicus Alumni Association, I have the specific ability to provide special facilities for living and studying, in the form of the Andronicus Chapter House.

In the coming months, our new non-profit corporation — the Shankland-Andronicus Restored Chapter House project, or SARCH — will begin its fundraising effort to help repair and restore the Chapter House. Friends and Alumni will be able to make tax-deductible donations to SARCH to benefit this work.

In related news, the Andronicus Alumni Association's May "social" meeting was to replace the mostly disintegrated roof over the woodshop. Over a dozen people turned out for this combined Alumni-Active event. While the alumni (and a few brave Actives) toughed it out on the 45-degree roof, the actives cleaned and repaired several of the fraternal props. It was a long-overdue event for all activities involved. The only unfortunate part of the entire weekend was a slight underestimate of the time needed to finish the roof: We were able to complete the plywood sheathing, but the roofing felt and shingles will need to wait until another weekend. Another upcoming event is the Annual Business Meeting. This is the special meeting each year when eligible Alumni Members (basically any Brothers other than Actives) vote on Association matters, including the election of the Executive Board. As we have done in recent years, the Annual Business Meeting will be held at 2:00 PM on Saturday, August 20, following the Andronicus Chapter's Roark Day Rush event. Alumni are encouraged to also participate in the Roark Day event; please plan to arrive between 9:00 and 9:30 AM.

Even if you are not interested in running for a position, I hope you take this opportunity to stay involved in our Fraternity. I look forward to seeing you there!
